Special Dr. Patti France Edition Of Around The College



On August 17, 2022, the College community received an email broadcast from St. Clair College President Patti France announcing that she had informed the College Board of Governors that she would not be renewing her contract when it expires in August 2024. By that time, President France will have worked at the College for over 35 years, including two terms as the President when her term is concluded.

Patti began her career at the College as a part-time employee with a clerical position in the Registrar's Office. Then, after a few years of working full-time at St. Clair, she took the opportunity to return to school to earn a graduate certificate in continuing education and a diploma in computer science. It then took ten (10) long years - one course at a time - for her to complete her bachelor's degree in adult education before sprinting through her master's degree in 18 months. This was followed by a wide variety of experiences throughout the College. "I'm a believer in lifelong

education, and I think if you continue to make sure that you're constantly taking advantage of learning opportunities formally or informally - I think that's very important," President France said.

In 2015, Patti succeeded Dr. John Strasser, President of St. Clair College. As President, she has overseen the design and construction of various multi-million dollar infrastructure projects over the last seven years, such as the SportsPlex, Toldo Health Sciences Centre, Sports Park, the Zekelman Tennis Centre and the Zekelman Centre for Business and Information Technology. Patti's impact on the entire community became evident as the retirement announcement, although not taking effect for two years, spawned recognition of the high esteem with which she is held throughout Windsor-Essex and Chatham-Kent.

Key To The City Of Windsor

On August 25, 2022, City of Windsor Mayor Drew Dilkens bestowed St. Clair College President Dr. Patti France with the highest award that the City of Windsor can confer, the key to the city. He recognized President France and the College for volunteering the use of the SportsPlex as a regional field hospital for COVID-19 patients during the most severe phases of the pandemic.

"It was St. Clair College, led by you, Patti, who stepped up right away when we were talking about a field hospital," Mayor Dilkens said. "You told (Windsor Regional Hospital CEO) David Musyj to take the SportsPlex and do what he needed to do to respond to the community. It was amazing to see that response. It was the first field hospital opened and was one of the biggest




and probably among the most impressive." Mayor Dilkens also credited President France for keeping the College open throughout the pandemic and allowing students to continue pursuing their educations - first online and then in person once restrictions were lifted.

An admittedly surprised President France accepted the ceremonial plaque adorned with the City of Windsor's coat of arms, her name engraved in gold lettering and a large key and thanked Mayor Dilkens before he concluded his address by thanking the entire St. Clair College faculty, staff, and community for their combined efforts during the pandemic.

"Patti is the leader, but I know all of you had your own cross to bear throughout all of this," Mayor Dilkens said. "So thank you for working with everyone to ensure we can get through this as a community."

Around the College

- 1. Two Members of Parliament recently paid a visit to students of the first Electrical Pre-Apprenticeship program for Women to celebrate them achieving their training goals.
- 2. St. Clair College's Rocket League team went International when they went to Birmingham, England to represent Canada in the first-ever Commonwealth Esport Championships (CEC) as part of the 2022 Commonwealth Games this August.
- 3. St. Clair College Esport took home 14 awards at the National Association of Collegiate Esport (NACE) Annual Awards held in Kansas City, Mo. as part of the NACE Annual Convention. Major awards for the Saints included Dawson Lovell being named Call of Duty Coach of the Year, Josh Podruzny being awarded Rocket League Player of the Year and winning the program taking home Production of the Year, beating out two-time winner Boise State.
- 4. The official grand opening of the renovated and newly named **Don France Student Commons** took place on Wednesday, August 24, 2022. The new facility is a grand expansion of the Student Centre. The Student Centre was first constructed in the mid-1990s and is owned and operated by the Student Representative Council (SRC). They designated much of the Student Centre as the *Don France Student Commons* in tribute to their

former General Manager, Don France, and his 25 years of mentorship of student leaders and advocacy. Current SRC General Manager Ryan Peebles described Don France as a friend, mentor, sounding board, advisor, idea-man and sometimes a father figure. "(Don) has been all of that, and more, to 25 years of SRC board members. It's a tribute to his impact upon their lives that many of those SRC alumni have returned to the college today to share this day with him," Peebles said. "Students in general since the mid-1990s may not have known Don in that very close fashion, but they've all benefited from his dedication – not just in terms of the facilities he has developed, but more importantly for the services and programs that he created to make their college experience easier and more enjoyable, and for the advocacy he demonstrated to protect their rights."

5. On August 24, 2022, St. Clair College unveiled its state-of-the-art esport facility, "Nexus". The \$23 million, two-

year construction project included the creation of two upper floors of classrooms for the Zekelman Schools of Business and Information Technology, the expansion of the ground floor of the Student Centre and the crown jewel, Nexus, a state-of-theart 15,000-square-foot Esport arena and broadcasting facility for the St. Clair Saints Gaming team and home of the two-year Esport Administration and Entrepreneurship diploma program at St. Clair College. St. Clair College was the first postsecondary institution in Canada to introduce esport as a varsity team and an academic program in 2016. Like traditional athletics, Saints Gaming players earn scholarships to compete in video



gaming leagues against colleges and universities worldwide. Nexus is a world-class facility, which sets St. Clair College as the gold standard for esport programs among postsecondary schools with five breakout rooms. A ceremonial opening of Nexus to demonstrate its operational features took place on October 1st. The Student Centre was first constructed in the mid-1990s and is owned and operated by the Student Representative Council (SRC). 6. The Windsor Star annually conducts a survey of readers who vote on their local favorites. St. Clair was selected as the "Best Adult Education/Career College."

Dr. Patti France Community Promenade

Located at the Cabana Road entrance to the College property, the Dr. Patti France Community Promenade features a decorative steel archway suspended between two stone pillars adorned with steel-fabricated light fixtures and mythical griffins. A garden surrounds the pillared archway with green shrubbery and gold flowers to honour the school's colours. The promenade serves as the starting point of a pathway to connect the main campus from north to south through a walking trail leading to the St. Clair Sports Park. There will be a nine (9) foot gold griffin affixed on top of the pillar with the commemorative plaque. The griffin is in the finishing stages of fabrication.



Queen's Platinum Jubilee Award To Patti France



On September 8, 2022, St. Clair College President Patti France was presented with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee pin from Essex MP, Chris Lewis in recognition of her commitment to our community. It was presented on the same day that the queen passed which was unexpected by all.

In his presentation, MP Lewis said, "For all of your leadership and support during COVID, especially when you provided the College's SportsPlex as a community field hospital with Windsor Regional Hospital we are all grateful." *

- 7. The Fall enrolment as reported to the Ministry showed an enrolment decrease of 2% from Fall 2021 to Fall 2022, which is being attributed to the problem with visas for international students.
- 8. Launching in the Fall 2022, eleven reproductions of artworks from the collection of Art Windsor-Essex (AWE) have been placed throughout St. Clair College's main campus. Art collector and philanthropist Stephanie Zekelman selected 11 works by 8 artists for the project. The large, thought-provoking reproductions bring bold colour and abstract shapes to gathering spaces and along walking paths across campus.
- 9. The St. Clair Women's Softball team finished the season with a 34 0 record; had six players named to the nine player All Star

team; a pitcher chosen as the Player of the Year; another player as Rookie of the Year; and the coach chosen as the Manager of the Year. This team won both the **Provincial** and the **National Gold Medals**.

During this time, our students competed against many prestigious design schools internationally earning Gold, Silver, and Bronze through the years. Our faculty went on to present sessions on unique educational teaching methods at the annual conferences, while networking with professional colleagues from around the world.

This process in accreditation encouraged me to further my own education, and in the spring of 2006, I graduated with honors from Lawrence Technological University - earning a Bachelor of Science of Interior Architecture. I was granted the title of member of Tau Sigma Delta (Honor Society in Architecture and Allied Arts).

Later in my career, I had the opportunity to teach abroad in China, which was the experience of a lifetime, and one I look back on with pride. Immersing myself into a new culture and educational system, was most memorable.

The St. Clair family has granted me such memorable moments. First and foremost, are the many students who have become part of my life, some of whom are now personal friends and will remain in my heart.

Thank you, St. Clair, for the memories! As I embark on my involvement with the Retirees Association, I can stay connected and reminisce with colleagues and friends, and I look forward to building new connections.

I attended Gordon McGregor Elementary School and Walkerville Collegiate. I completed my Bachelor of English and Bachelor of Education degrees at the University of Windsor and a Master's degree in Education – concentrations in Administration & Curriculum Development from Central Michigan University. As a lifelong learner, I continued my erudition in the Doctoral program - Business Management, at Monarch

While teaching Express Scribe – a machine transcription program in which OA students listen to and transcribe from tapes of speakers that dictate correspondence, we were met with deaf students who were not able to do so. With the assistance of a Sign Language Interpreter, I developed a process with which deaf students would likewise be able to transcribe office documents in a timely fashion.

Realizing the importance of total immersion in my job, I have sat on numerous committees. These consisted of Health & Safety, Student Cheating, Communication in the Workplace, and Academic Council. I have also participated in marketing our OA cluster of programs on AM 800. Acting as Master of Ceremonies at Convocations - was perhaps one of my most enjoyable roles at the college because celebrating our students' successes speaks to our success as faculty.

On a personal note, I am proud of my two sons. John works for a financial company and teaches adult education part time; David is currently COO of a housing corporation. My greatest joys are my grandchildren, Keaton Zora, aged 6 and Davison Kane, aged 3. I also enjoy books, music, interior design, and travel. My journeys throughout the US, Caribbean, and Europe have been extensive, yet my preferred destination is in my own backyard – Western Canada. **

years with the St. Clair College Retirees' Association.




