The Zekelman Contribution

In a relatively short period of time, Barry Zekelman, Chair and CEO of Zekelman Industries, North America's largest independent steel tube manufacturer, has had a significant and dramatic impact on St. Clair College.

It all started in 2018 with a \$5 million contribution to the College and the creation of the Zekelman School of Business and Information Technology at One Riverside Drive West, right across the street from the St. Clair Centre for the Arts. These two facilities, in addition to the Mediaplex, give the College unparalleled post-secondary visibility in the City of Windsor's downtown core.

Although not insignificant, that initiative was just the beginning. Construction began in 2020 on the Zekelman Centre for Business and Information Technology at the South Campus. This \$23 million dollar expansion will add 40000 sq. ft. to the South West wing of the campus and, in turn, will increase the number of classrooms, study areas, meeting rooms and offices, while also adding a large auditorium named Alumni Hall. As if that

were not enough, the centrepiece of this expansion will be the construction of Canada's first Esports Arena.

Additionally, Barry and Stephanie Zekelman have made a significant contribution to the College's new \$26 million Sports Park. This facility will seat 1500 spectators who can view games of soccer, football, women's softball and sand volleyball. The complex also includes the four-court Zekelman Tennis Centre.

Finally, Zekelman Industries is a major player in the construction of the new \$23 million St. Clair College International Student Residence at the South Campus. This 5-storey facility, comprised of 300 modular units, will contain 62 four-bedroom apartment-style dorms, and four two-bedroom units, capable of housing up to 512 students. The modular units are being supplied by - you guessed it - a subsidiary of Zekelman Industries.

St. Clair College/Maintenance/Caretakers

By any name they worked hard

The first pay-cheque I ever received at the College came in late 1973 or early 1974. I was working, thanks to Nadine Burke, Tom Markham and Cal Haddad, in the Student Government office on the 3rd floor (where the Finance Dept. is now located). I had a number of jobs through that office. They included putting up event flyers on the walls around the College, working in the radio station in the cafeteria (CING Radio), working in the Maple Tree Pub, and marketing the College and its programs at Devonshire Mall and other locations. My favourite duty was taking over from Nadine Burke when she went on vacation (because, in my mind, I was running the office).

Anyway, through those various jobs I met (and truly appreciated) five of the hardest working people I have ever known....and I mean hard “physically”, day in and day out. We called them janitors back then, but the name did not matter. They reported to Jake (Mr. Willis Jacob) on the Day Shift. These five men were Hugh Cochrane, Carmine Denunzio, Don Zverina, Fred Caston and Remo Mancini.

In those days, if there was anything that needed moving, fixing and/or building, in most cases it fell on the laps of these men to complete. When someone ordered office equipment, for example a desk, the supplying company did not assemble the product. They delivered it to Receiving, and these folks (and sometimes it would be the night shift janitors) would pick it up, bring it to the appropriate office, move any other furniture around to make room for it, put it together and then haul all the packing materials away.

They, along with the nights shift staff, were also responsible for all cleaning and garbage collection around the College, as well as driving the College open-bed truck for pickups and deliveries to various off-campus locations.

However, one of the most tedious tasks they did occurred many times each year....and that would be walking up and down the stairs in the 2 main storage areas (called crawl spaces) each time various departments needed to store records, furniture or other items....or if they'd need something delivered to them from those storage areas. It wasn't just the walking up and down the stairs with the heavy boxes that was an issue....you'd get spots in the storage areas where you could end up walking into heavy pipes if you didn't duck at the right time.

Additionally, with the College having to save their records for 7 years, some of the areas became so full that you'd have to move a number of boxes just to clear room for new items and/or if you needed to find a specific box.

These men obviously aged over the years and I worked even more closely with them when I started my full-time job in Receiving. Well that aging led to some complaints about the physicality of the job...especially the “up and down the stairs” bit. Which leads me to one funny moment I will never forget....Don Zverina was just getting ready to retire and the College announced that they were going to install an elevator in the largest storage area. You could put the boxes in the elevator, but you weren't allowed to ride in it yourself.... but this meant that you could walk up and down the stairs empty-handed....which was a huge relief to many. However, Don started making note of the fact, quite frequently, that “they waited until I was going to retire to get an elevator”.

At that time, we had a small sign-making machine in Receiving, and we were responsible for making all the signs for doors that indicated room numbers and names of staff in offices. Therefore, I took advantage of this machine to make a sign in tribute to Don. I hung the sign beside the elevator door (and to my knowledge, it might still be there today). I found Don and I told him I had a double-meaning present for him. We walked to the elevator and he got what I meant right away. The sign reads “Don's Shaft”.

Randy Primeau, Manager of Construction & Engineering Services at the College graciously provided the following information about the fence. It is 1.83 metre (6 feet) high and 900+ metres (3,000 feet) long, stretching from the Lennon Drain on the College grounds southward to the property of the Villages of St. Clair Long Term Care facility at the southernmost limits of the College property. Additionally, the College generously paid for the acquisition and installation of gates in the fence for every neighbouring property.

The neighbouring properties north of the Lennon Drain were not part of the initial phase of the fence project. Therefore the College has plans to extend the fence 183 metres (600 feet) northward from the Lennon Drain to Cabana Road this year. Upon completion of the second phase, the fence will extend the full length of the eastern boundary of the College grounds. ✨

We Have An Author Among Us!



Her name is Mary Anne Adam (you may know her as M.A. McMurray). She worked at St. Clair College from 1986 – 1997, first as an administrative assistant to V.P. Brian Desbiens, and later as the Liaison Officer in the Office of the Registrar. After leaving the College, she earned an EASL (English As a Second Language) Teaching Certificate, and taught EASL online for many years, as well as teaching Communication classes through Continuing Education at the College, EASL classes through the University of Windsor's Centre for English Language Development, and LINC (Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada) classes at the Women's Enterprise Skills Development (WEST).

When asked how she became interested in writing a novel, Mary Anne explained that the idea was always in the back of her mind, but she was never sure of a storyline. It wasn't until she moved to Amherstburg and first saw Belle Vue, the neo-Palladian/neo-classical country estate of Robert Reynolds built over 200 years ago, that the story began to take shape. The more Mary Anne learned about Belle Vue, the more interested she became in its rich history. This in turn led to extensive research into the Reynolds family, the indigenous peoples of the Amherstburg area, those who escaped slavery in the south to find freedom here, and those who came to this area from Ireland in search of a new life during the devastating potato famine. Her historical-fiction novel entitled, *The Medicine Bag*, brings together four women who, despite their different cultures, share one common bond.

This labour of love, four years in the making, will be published by Cranberry Tree Press and available in local bookstores in late April, hopefully including the River Bookshop in Amherstburg owned by Richard and Colleen Peddie (yes, **that** Richard Peddie, Toronto Maple Leaf fans). Belle Vue is now a National Historic Site in much need of repair and renovations. Part of the proceeds from the sale of *The Medicine Bag*, will be earmarked to replace one of the windows at Belle Vue.

If you are a historical-fiction novel and local history buff, want to learn more about the Huron-Wendat culture, and enjoy supporting a former colleague, you may want to read *The Medicine Bag*.

In July 1967, Parma Varma assumed the position of Education Planning Director, responsible for conducting an educational demand survey for both Essex and Kent Counties in order to determine the curriculum, human resources, facilities' needs, and enrollment projections for St. Clair College.

In 1992, Tom McCarthy, then Vice President of Administration, wrote, "Through a rigorous process of industrial research, work with Boards of Education, and demographic data analysis, he (Parma) predicted accurately the basic program mix demand, facilities requirements, and market satisfaction limits which became the foundation of our operations for more than 20 years."

Parma Varma truly left his mark on St. Clair College. ✨
