The Tragic Futility Of War - Lest we Forget

Monday, November 11, 1918 dawned a rainy, dreary day in the Mons sector of the fluid front separating the hostile parties in WWI. At 6:30 that morning, the Canadian Corps received official communication that an armistice was to come into effect at 11:00 a.m. ending the *Great War*, the "*War to end all wars*". By 9:30 a.m., most Canadian units had received word of the armistice by telegram or runner. There are reports that most of the officers urged their soldiers not to endanger their lives and to find a hole in the ground and stay there.

For Pte Price and a few soldiers of the 28th Canadian Infantry Battalion, the war was not yet over. Price was leading a small patrol to the east of Mons to look for German soldiers. They crossed a small bridge across a narrow canal to search houses concealing a German machine gun post. In the first house that they entered, they found only the owner and his family. The Germans had retreated through the back door. As he was leaving the next house, Pte Price fell mortally wounded, shot in the right chest by a German sniper, just one month short of his 26th birthday.

At 10:58 a.m., 2 minutes before the armistice, Pte George Price was the last Canadian and Commonwealth soldier to be killed in a war that claimed the lives of an estimated 15 to 22 million human beings.

George Lawrence Price was born and raised in Falmouth, Nova Scotia. Like many young men, he had moved west in search of work and adventure. He worked for a time as a farm labourer in Moose Jaw Saskatchewan, and later was conscripted into the Canadian army in Regina.

Such is the insanity of the human race in the pursuit of war.

Meet Your New Chatham Campus Coordinator



For Mary Beth Rush, it all started in Chatham and continues there to this day.

Dad, now deceased, worked at Campbell Soup for 40 years; Mom, now 91, worked for Bell early on before having five children and deciding it was best she stay home. Mary Beth is the second oldest.

Mary Beth's early years in school started in a country school in Charing Cross, where the family lived for most of her childhood. When the country school closed she was bused to St. Mary's in Blenheim and then to Blenheim District High School.

Right out of high school, she took an entry-level job at the Union Gas Head Office in Chatham, and, over a span of ten years, worked her way up to the position of Corporate Lead Operator - the company's first word processing specialist, responsible for training, support, and application design for users throughout the company.

During this time, Mary Beth married Joe, a millwright who worked at Siemens and Meritor (MSSC). Their only daughter was born in 1983 and Mary Beth went on maternity leave. Shortly after returning to work, and while contemplating a lifestyle change to stay home with her daughter, a relative left the College, creating an open position teaching word processing courses evenings and weekends, reporting to Lynn Wraight. Mary Beth jumped right in! The year was 1984.

From there, her career at the College was a dizzying array of activities: while she continued to work for Continuing Education, Jay Ertel came calling for a sessional Office Administration teacher to cover a maternity leave. That opened the door to several years as a part-time and sessional instructor primarily for the Business and Office Administration Programs, as well as Corporate Training, and professional development. During this time, she also covered a temporary vacancy as secretary in the Business department and was later hired full time in the position after a short hiatus at home. Mary Beth continued in these dual roles until the early 90's.

In 1993, the Paradigm Shift under the direction of Gaston Franklyn resulted in new positions for classroom technicians. Mary Beth was hired, but before she could even begin, the College went searching for an Office Automation Specialist at the Windsor campus—someone who could learn the new Word Perfect Office software, write training manuals for both VAX and PC users, and develop and execute a training program for the email and scheduling components of WP Office. During that 2-year project the vast majority of then current employees at all campuses attended training sessions at Rhodes Campus and met Mary Beth, (whether they remember it or not!)

At the end of 1994, Mary Beth returned to Chatham to the Computer Services Technician role, sharing her time between the classroom and Computing Services until 2000. Then followed a two-year stint in the Centre for Instruction Delivery at Thames Campus. After the closing of the CID's, Mary Beth moved to the role of Administrative Assistant to Patricia McFarlane, the Principal of Thames Campus, and to John Lawrence, Manager of Corporate and Community Training, and she remained there until Tricia's retirement. After a relatively brief role in Scheduling, Mary Beth moved to Student Services as Assistive Technologist/Learning Strategist and Peer Tutoring at the Chatham Campus. Whew! She retired in 2021.

Mary Beth served for many years on the Chatham Health & Safety Committee, and as steward and executive member for Local 137. She participated on Academic Affairs, Academic Council, and Strategic Planning Steering Committees, the Thames Retention and Orientation Committee, and the College's 50th Anniversary Committee to name a few.

A lifelong learner, Mary Beth completed her Information Technology and Multimedia Applications Certificates, Office Admin Executive diploma, Instructional Skills workshops, and received her Adult Education Certificate from Brock University along with a long list of professional development courses.

Some of her fondest College memories include her years working in the classroom. She credits Dawn Erickson and Tricia Mc-Farlane as mentors who became life-long friends, along with so many others that were part of the close-knit Chatham family and the extended Windsor family she met and worked with over the years. She particularly enjoyed being part of the Thames Party Planners, who collectively threw some legendary staff retirement parties and pot-luck gatherings over the years! And she is forever grateful to Lynn Wraight and Jay Ertel for giving her those early opportunities.

Mary Beth also loves to travel and has been to several countries in Europe, Alaska, Australia, and points across Canada, the US, and Central America. She is also an avid gardener and enjoys relaxing in her happy place. Mary Beth's and Joe's daughter, now an RPN, has seven children, so now it's Grandma Mary Beth!

Tour of Historic Amherstburg

The day started out just as the last few days had, just below blisteringly hot! Memo to self - no more outdoor events in July. All in all, our historical tour of the Town of Amherstburg was an eye opener for those of us who had maybe not realized how much of a role the area played in making Canada a sovereign nation.

We were initially greeted by the Town Crier, Norm Ross, who announced to the town that the St. Clair College Retirees had arrived, what a way to feel special! We were invited to tour the Gordon House and Visitor's Centre. Built in 1798 the house is the oldest building in Amherstburg and boasts four fireplaces, original pine floors and a unique Doll Exhibit featuring, amongst many, a shelf of various styles of Dionne Quintuplets dolls.

Our next stop was the King's Navy Yard were our guides, Norm Ross (Town Crier) and Murray Speers - Courier de Bois and self-proclaimed knitter - took turns explaining how the now beautifully landscaped waterfront was once docks and wharves as far as the eye could see. Ships of all sizes and from many locations docked in Amherstburg to bring supplies and trade for furs and other goods from the area. They also brought soldiers, armaments and equipment for the war with the United States. The tales Norm and Murray regaled us with gave a picture of a settlement that, with the assistance of the local indigenous people, fought the invasion of Canada from the American forces

Although the heat and humidity were a bit oppressive, we pressed on to the Park House, the end of our tour. Beautifully displayed with period furniture, the house is an example of Piece sur Piece log construction and was built

in the mid 1700's. The building was moved to its current site in 1972. Currently the basement serves as a classroom for those who want to learn tinsmithing. The fruits of the labour of participants are sold in the onsite gift shop.

Formerly the Sarah Elliott House, it was built in the mid-1800s and boasts an impressive main staircase. Relaxing with good food and excellent company, we reviewed the tour and agreed we are lucky to have such history so close to our own backyard. Thanks to the 25 attendees for making this an excellent learning experience. **

Around The College

- 1. The official Fall enrolment numbers show an overall decrease in students enrolled at St. Clair College campuses. The College has seen a 23 per cent reduction in the number of students enrolled at Windsor and Chatham campuses for Fall 2025, with 9,383 students, compared to 12,235 at the same time last year. The decline is tied directly to a shrinking international student population, which dropped from 4,641 in 2024 to 1,732 students at the Windsor and Chatham campuses which represents a nearly 63 per cent decrease in the international stream. There were 7,645 domestic students compared to 7,594 last Fall.
- 2. As a result of the enrolment changes, the College is undergoing financial stress which is resulting in major program and staff adjustments. For example, the College is looking to reduce its footprint in downtown Windsor and has suspended over 20 programs.
- 3. Thousands of other new graduates had their diplomas and degrees conferred at St. Clair College's eleventh and twelfth sessions of Fall Convocation on Sept. 30, 2025, at the WFCU Centre. This increases grad numbers to well over 150,000.
- 4. The Canadian Mental Health Association and the Windsor-Essex County Health Unit held the annual Suicide Awareness Walk at St. Clair College on Sunday, Sept. 7, 2025. Hundreds of people gathered this weekend to walk in solidarity, share stories of loss and hope, and raise awareness for suicide prevention, turning grief into action one step at a time. St. Clair College President Michael Silvaggi and student government leaders presented a cheque for \$15,000 at the event.
- 5. The work stoppage by College support staff began at Ontario's 24 Public Colleges, including St. Clair College, on September 11, 2025. A tentative settlement was reached on Wednesday, October 15. The results of a ratification vote were not available at this writing.
- 6. St. Clair College Alumni and Windsor International Film Festival have partnered for new custom cinema screen at Chrysler Theatre. The custom-made high performance cinema screen at St. Clair College's Chrysler Theatre will be front and centre at this year's WIFF.
- 7. The Ontario Collegiate Athletic Association (OCAA) Baseball playoffs were hosted at Lacasse Park in Tecumseh, Ont. from Oct. 16 to 18, 2025, where the Saints Men's Baseball team is looking to win its fifth consecutive banner.
- 8. Dr. Gelsea Pizzuto Serra and the Research and Innovation department at St. Clair College has been awarded \$20,000 from the WE-SPARK Igniting Discovery grant program to launch a project that promotes literacy beginning at birth.
- 9. St. Clair College's nationally recognized Saints Esports program continues to build on its global reputation, announcing the recruitment of 63 new varsity student athletes for the Fall 2025 season. This year's class includes 38 recruits from the Windsor-Essex region and 11 from various countries.
- 10. Students in the Architectural Technology and Mechanical Engineering Technician Industrial (Millwright) program put their skills to the test while assisting a local athletic club, designing and constructing a brand-new announcing tower pavilion for Wolfe Creek BMX Racetrack in Chatham.
- 11. The Saints Student Athletics Association (SSAA) has provided the Athletic department with a cheque for \$21,000 after a series of successful events and fundraisers over the summer. **



Answers to Trivia Quiz

- 1. *Liquid cats*. From the SCCRA 'IT' Department

The 'face' of the internet is forever changing with new and evolving scams and such. It's extremely difficult to keep track of them all. Some of the media outlets do keep track of the latest in scams, but others don't. You may find an article on the outlets' web page but not necessarily in print. If you can handle the other "junk" online, check out the webpages at media sites such as windsorstar.com, lfpress.com, thestar. com, torontosun.com, and nypost.com. A story which may pop up on one site may not make it to others. There are reputable creators on YouTube who are worthy of following. That list is to follow.

My Cogeco account sees a plethora (I like that word) of spam, phishing, and other nefarious emails.

So, to clear out the Junk folder, here is a summary of what I have, and what you should be looking for.

True Spam - Believe it or not, there will be actual spam (https://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/spam). These obvious messages want to sell you something. Ignore and delete them. There may even be a document for you to look at. Just ignore them.

Even the SRetiree account gets the occasional real spam message. The College Outlook e-mail program usually and correctly recognizes them and throws them into the Junk folder.

False Promises - Someone wants to give you a \$2 or \$3 million share of their multimillion (or billion) dollar winnings. The name is legit (but several years old) but the sender is not the winner.

Same goes for those e-mails wanting to share their millions (or billions) for a long departed relative or government official, usually from Africa (hence the Nigerian scams). The text may refer to an account manager at a recognizable bank. But note, it's a Gmail account not the bank's.

Questionable Sender - When you receive an e-mail from someone, one thing to check is the sender and his or her address.

My Cogeco Thunderbird program (as does Outlook) shows the purported sender and their email address. For example, a message from "Cogeco" comes from Team ID <mc.western at talktalk.net>; and there are many messages with that same theme. (Once you're on a list....)

In addition, they usually come with some sort of threat – Oh No, no more mail for you, etc.

A message from the CRA with a refund comes from an e-mail sent from the Caribbean, or it has a major error in the name, such as Revenue Agency of Canada <.....@labgex.com>

If you are a Gmail user, the sender's email address may be hidden. To see it, click on the down arrow below the from/to field. It will show the email address AND the domain it was

emailed from. You can also click on reply to see where it's going but DON'T send it.



The above box will reveal info to help determine if it's fake.

Questionable Text/Language - See anything wrong here? "CLAIM YOUR GRATUITOUS_CAR_EMERGENCY_KIT"

This one cannot get it right. Yes, what you see is what I got:

Dubious Links - This can be a big giveaway. (No, not that kind of giveaway – see the Nigerian scam above). If you're provided with a link to continue whatever process, do not click on the link. Take your mouse and place it (hover) over the link. If it claims to be from the CRA, then why does it want you to go to some random third party site?

Dubious Contact Info - Don't rely on contact information provided in a dubious message. The link (shown above will be one way to redirect you, but also phone numbers can too. It could be an 800 number, or a long distance. Area codes 613, 343, and 753 are popular sources. They are Ottawa, Ontario numbers intended to make you believe that they are official government numbers. You may see a number from a local area code (519 or 226, and now 548) for example), but the remaining number will be a mystery.

Use a reverse lookup utility such as https://www.canada411. ca/search/reverse.html to check first. Unknown 800 numbers can be searched at https://800notes.com/.
