- 1. Hundreds of **graduates from dozens of programs** received the ultimate recognition of their hard work their diplomas and certificates at the Feb. 20, 2025 Winter Convocation at the St. Clair College Centre for the Arts Chrysler Theatre.
- 2. St. Clair College has been named one of 'Southwestern Ontario's Top Employers' for 2025 by Mediacorp Canada Inc. This competition highlights the area's diverse industries and dynamic employment landscape in southwestern Ontario, which has long been considered the manufacturing and agriculture engine of Ontario.
- 3. St. Clair College students from several programs bundled into sleeping bags and tents on Friday, February 8, to **raise awareness and funds for those experiencing homelessness.** The Windsor Residence for Young Men (WRYM) provided participants with a glimpse into the harsh realities faced by young people who do not have a safe place to call home.

My Island In The Sun - Barbados

The first time I visited Barbados was in 1986. My parents had been staying with their "gang" on the island for so many year, that they had received Honorary Citizenship, and they wanted me to experience the island they loved so much. Many years and over 45 trips later, my husband Frank and I have made Barbados our winter getaway and we have been lucky to share it with our children, my sister and her children and our best friends.

Only 24 miles by 14 miles, this little piece of heaven has changed, as everything must, over the many years we have been going there, but one thing has not, the graciousness of its people. Good manners, friendly greetings, and a very high level of literacy/education are hallmarks of these industrious people. The history of Barbados ranges from the Amerindian settlements over a thousand years ago to colonization by the British in 1627 and finally It's independence, declaring itself a Republic in 2023.

Barbados got its name from the Portuguese explorers who called the island Los Barbados which means "the bearded ones". The beards they referred to are the hanging roots of the many bearded fig trees that hug the shoreline. The British, always at war with either the French or the Spanish back in the 1600 hundreds built a garrison on the island, a major tourist attraction that still stands today and is still a working military defence operation. One of the big no-no's that is very strictly enforced on the island, as my son found out, is that no one is allowed to wear camouflage clothing except the military. His shorts had to go back into the drawer until we got home.

Very much aware of the wealth the island could generate through its sugar cane and rum production, many "landowners" built great plantation houses that are now interesting tourist attractions. Many foreigners lived the life of the rich and powerful on the backs of indigenous people, slaves, and the indentured people who were shipped out of England to pay their debts as servants and cane workers during those years. It is not unusual to find inhabitants with red hair, green or blue eyes and skin of various shades adding to the beauty of this island.

Barbados itself is a mix of terrains. Beaches of soft warm sand that are all open to anyone who wants to wander them, a sea of so many shades of blue an artist would be lost to capture them all, tiny yellow birds whose beaks and tongues are almost as long as their bodies and sunsets that defy description by this writer. The Green Monkeys, that can be found all over the Island, do truly have a greenish tinge to their fur and have lent their name to a Championship golf course and one of the finest chocolatiers to ever produce a macaron.

An island of varying scenery - from the soft sands of its West Coast to its crashing waves and jagged rocks of the North where the Atlantic meets the Caribbean, to its South Coast where surfing competitions are held at the Soup Bowl, and to its interior where cane fields still produce some of the finest rum in the world - my island in the sun is heaven on earth.

From the SCCRA 'IT' Department Chapter 4 - A Summary of Red Flags

- 1. Does the FROM address come from the alleged company source rather than a foreign country nor a Gmail account? A Thunderbird hint: The FROM field can be set to display in a number of ways. Look under Settings; General; Message List. Best to use the option "Full Name and email address".
- 2. Do they want a list of your personal information (including bank numbers or SIN or credit card numbers, etc.)
- 3. Does the link in the message actually point you to somewhere 'legit'?
- 4. Have you actually dealt with the stated company on a current order or transaction?
- 5. Are you the possible recipient of a load of money from some unknown far-off relative?
- **6. Does the word 'kindly' or 'okay' appear in the message?** Many scams from African nations like to use those words a lot.
- **7. Do the messages contain a lot of spelling or grammar mistakes**? My Cogeco account currently has dozens of spam/phish messages in the junk folder. They are invariably very similar in features: Remember, most are supposed to be from 'Cogeco'.
 - From: Gmail, AOL, Hotmail, Germany
 - To: Most are to undisclosed recipients or BCC'd addresses. You should expect at least a personalized address.
 - Salutation: personalized, not 'Dear Users'
 - False Announcements: a Rogers/Cogeco Collaboration??
 - False Upgrade: *You need to upgrade Webmail*. Webmail is the responsibility of the service provider. You only need to use a browser or a direct client like Thunderbird to access your e-mail. But no, you need not update Webmail.
 - Spelling and Grammar:
 - Accidental: Foreign-sourced messages will typically misspell common words. Be wary.
 - On Purpose: Pay attention to the key words shown. Terminology, company names such as COGECO vs the fake COGECO. See the difference?
 - Fake Links: Where does the message point to. It may say Cogeco.ca but actually points to somewhere else in the world. **Hovering** over the link with your mouse will tell you.
 - Thunderbird has an option where if you right-click on a link in that spam message, you can report an email scam to Google assuming the message came from Gmail. Not sure if it helps, but why not?
