Introducing Our New President



Ross Langill was born in Windsor and lived in what was then Sandwich West. His dad was a jeweller in both Windsor and the US. Mom was a late blooming teacher who started at the Sun Parlour School for the Developmentally Delayed, and younger brother Ron lives in Waterloo where he provides IT services for an insurance company.

Ross attended Ivor Chandler Public School, and then split time in high school among Centennial, Massey, and Sandwich West Secondary Schools. Upon graduation, he elected to go to St. Clair College for the Travel and Tourism Program taught by the likes of Jean Brechkow. Unfortunately, Ross found attending classes challenging. He then tried Business Common also to no avail, although he values to this day the typing elective taught by Bernice Jewell, and the friendship he developed with another elective teacher, Joe Lucas.

Although Ross loved being at St. Clair College, he was on the verge of gaining a diploma in Cafeteria Skills Management, when he was approached by fellow student Tom Markham who was active with student government and reported to Cal Haddad. Tom asked if Ross wanted to help the student government with marketing. Therefore, for three years Ross helped with developing flyers, working at the pub and radio station, and doing lots of College Marketing at Devonshire Mall. Then, Ross became aware of the OCAP Program run by George Lewis and Florence Lytle. For one year, he was trained to do shipping and receiving under the tutelage of Sam Siddall. When Sam left for typewriting repair training, Ross took over, reporting to Chuck Harwood. In 1977, that job was posted as a full time opportunity and Ross jumped at it while later adding mailroom duties to his resume. In 1990, the New Democrats introduced the JobsOntario Program that assisted unemployed youth to access on-the-job training. Ross applied successfully for this work at the Eugenie Street location reporting to Ann Miskovsky. Then, in 1995, when Ontario Premier Mike Harris eliminated this program, Ross, faced with layoff, bumped into Parking Services, reporting to Brook Gardner. In 2010, the newly founded Employment Ontario Program at the Roundhouse Centre offered work Ross with which he was very familiar. He worked there for three years until his retirement in 2013.

Ross has two daughters: Diane is a nurse living and working in Michigan; Kellyanne is working locally in the fast food industry. In addition to having played his trombone with a number of bands over the years, Ross has also dabbled in theatre work.

At the College, Ross was very active with OPSEU Local 137 for a good 30 years, serving with the likes of Jill Morgan, Sam Siddall, and Sherry Sharon as a VP and Secretary while also representing the Local at both Divisional and Provincial meetings. He also represented Support Staff for many years on Academic Council and worked with Al Hoffman and Brook Gardner drafting the first College Student Code of Conduct. Ross values his time at the College and the many friendships that he developed during this employment. He is now thoroughly enjoying his retirement, and is excited to be working with the Retirees' Association. **

Around The College

- 1. St. Clair College has collaborated with local industry partners to develop a portable, solar-powered charging station for electric vehicles. The Research Department specializes in developing tailored solutions to address industry-specific challenges by harnessing our student and faculty talent and expertise.
- 2. The College has suspended 18 programs and is in the process of eliminating 69 positions as efforts continue to erase a \$6.5-million deficit, which was largely inflicted by federal government limits on foreign student numbers. President Michael Silvaggi isn't ruling out more cuts to "right-size" the school as it slides from surplus to deficit amid a forecasted revenue loss of \$122 million. The fall enrollment will have a huge impact.
- 3. Some local moms got the royal treatment at the St. Clair College Student Spa in advance of Mother's Day. The session was a collaboration between Family Respite Services Windsor-Essex and the College's Fast Track Esthetician program. It provided a relaxing experience for many local women who were treated to manicures and pedicures, along with a special dinner.
- 4. Students in the Liberal Arts program showcased projects which are having a positive impact at a number of community organizations. Four groups of students worked to support local organizations, addressing critical issues such as mental health, homelessness, accessibility, and immigrant support in the Windsor/Essex region. Their efforts resulted in impactful contributions at: Maryvale; the Welcome Centre Shelter for Women and Families; Assisted Living Southwestern Ontario; and Immigrant Support.
- 5. Universities across Canada recently gathered in Winnipeg, Manitoba, for the Canadian Society of Civil Engineering's National Concrete Canoe Competition. Twenty-two teams entered their six-metre canoes made entirely out of concrete. St. Clair College was the only College entrant among the post-secondary institutions from across the nation.
- 6. The largest ever graduating class (over 5,500 students) from St. Clair College had their diplomas, certificates, and degrees conferred during five Spring Convocation sessions in Windsor from June 2 to 4, 2025.
- 7. St. Clair College and the University of Windsor have received the maximum seven-year accreditation from the national accrediting body for nursing education in Canada, for the Collaborative Honours Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN) and Registered Practical Nurse Pathway to BScN programs. This is the highest possible term length for accreditations, only given to programs that exceed expectations, also recognizes the strength of curriculum, level of student support, quality of faculty, and commitment to innovation and improvement.
- 8. St. Clair College and Wayne State University in Detroit, Mich. have signed a new transfer agreement that will streamline the pathway process for St. Clair graduates in Paramedic or Occupational Therapist Assistant/Physiotherapist Assistant programs to complete a bachelor's degree at Wayne State University.
- 9. St. Clair College has been named one of Southwestern Ontario's **Top Employers** for Mediacorp Canada Inc. One of the key highlights which landed St. Clair College on the list is the College's community involvement, as well as that of its employees.
- 10. On Sunday, January 28, 2025, the College hosted a special convocation ceremony for the first cohort of the **Battery Manufacturing program**. St. Clair College partnered with Unifor, Stellantis, LG Energy Solutions, and NextStar Energy to offer this exciting new local manufacturing advancement. This was the first of two cohorts in the program, with the hopes that in the future it could evolve into a post-secondary program. ***

Flashback

For over 20 years, the St. Clair College Retirees' Association has been collecting, identifying, and cataloging College memorabilia. It is time to start **using** this material to entertain and educate retirees, staff, and students via regular **Flashbacks**. This is the first of many recollections on the College's creation and growth.

Birth Pains - Role of the College

St. Clair College was created in 1966, along with 17 other Ontario colleges, with one stroke of the pen by then Education Minister William Davis. St. Clair was one of a small number of colleges that had the good fortune of having a solid foundation upon which to build. Unlike a dozen or so new colleges, St. Clair absorbed the existing Western Ontario Institute of Technology (W.O.I.T.) which had been operating out of a condemned grade school building on Mercer Street, South of Wyandotte Street, offering programs in Mechanical, Chemical, and Electronic Technology, and Business Administration. These three-year programs all required a Grade 13 high school diploma, and admission was very selective. Students had a strict dress code, and were treated as if they were employees in industry. Class instruction ran from 33 to 36 hours per week.

While St. Clair College was very fortunate to have W.O.I.T. to build upon, not all was "roses" during this transition, as was reported in several early edition of "*The Saint*", the student newspaper of the day. While the other new colleges were all in a position to define brand new characteristics of their new student body, this new 'upstart' College had an existing student body with its traditions and rules that had to be considered.

Some of the strongest feelings were revealed over the dress code. While the new College leaned toward the relaxed dress codes experienced at various high schools from which the majority of students came, the remaining W.O.I.T. students favoured the strict dress code at W.O.I.T. As was traditional in the business world at the time, W.O.I.T. students were required to follow the dress code – blazers, dress shirt, and tie in all lectures and labs.

On page 3 of the January 12, 1968 issue of *The Saint*, an item expressing concern by the Student Administrative Council (SAC) over the design and colour of student graduation rings described a confrontation at a Board of Governors' meeting. The red grad ring was the choice of W.O.I.T. students; while new St. Clair students preferred a looser rule allowing a possible three-colour choice and availability for all students, not just for 'grads'.

The October 20, 1967 issue of *The Saint* described the contention over the school colours. W.O.I.T. students favoured red used on their blazers and sports teams. After alternatives were presented, the Board of Governors eventually chose, and approved, the current green, gold, and white.

Chapter 5 – Dealing with a phone spammer/phisher

There will be a bit of crossover (similarity) between email and phone scams, spams, and phishes.

First off, a few "tools" to help you deal with them.

1. Caller ID.

Phone numbers can be spoofed (faked) so you can't be sure the call coming in will be legit (just like an email address from a 'friend'). So having CALLER ID on your phone can be very handy. CALLER ID can be either phone number or caller's name – both spoofable. Some spoofed numbers can fake your area code so you'll think it's a local call. Do they look suspicious? Do you recognize either? There's nothing in the world that says you have to answer the call. Optional View: How the Caller ID scam works https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=jGsU-axXOsg. So thusly the next 'tool':

2. Voice Mail (aka the answering machine)

Whether supplied by the phone carrier or by your phone itself, if you're unsure of the incoming call, just let it go to voicemail. Then you can check the message and see if it's legit. Some calling services tend to not recognize the caller id system and will go right into their spiel cutting off the intro so you actually miss the sender name. I typically just delete those messages. These sometimes threaten with CRA type content so even more reason to ignore.

3. Calling back a message

There is a danger to returning a message- particularly if it's not local. There is a set of North American area codes that are NOT in the NA dialing system. These include many islands in the Caribbean, and territories of the US. They will typically have an additional (aka higher) long distance charge.

And now for a quick scam/phish update.

My junk folder went quiet for a while, and then all of a sudden new ones popped up. This includes fake billing, security warnings, and updates to software I don't have. The 25 junk mails I've received recently are all easily dismissible. Watch the sender's name and address, misspellings, and any questionable links, and you should be fine.

And as noted, if you right-click on the link in the message, you can submit it as a phish or scam. Just not sure if it actually works.

And a little trick (I think). Don't open an HTML (URL) attachment/link. But if you're curious, save it as a text (.TXT) file, and have a look. In a recent example, the attachment **Remittance Advice recieved #EMF-640098312.html** (note the spelling) actually contained another HTML link which can lead to trouble.

New: Smishing - It's a text message that comes to your phone, claiming that you owe money for using a toll road or for owing fees on a package delivery.

The message does not come from the official site.









In Memoriam
